Year 10

Year 10 have successfully completed another busy and productive half term as they continue to settle into the demands of their GCSE subjects. Across the year group, pupils have shown growing confidence and we are still witnessing a great deal of maturity towards their new GCSE studies!

We have had a busy half term for coursework deadlines in subjects such as Business and Health and Social Care. Many pupils have approached these with focus and determination, developing essential independent working skills. Miss Earl and Mrs Kirk-Roberts regularly had CP2 filled with pupils staying in at lunch to add, amend and try their hardest on their coursework - you are all fantastic!

Looking beyond the classroom, Year 10 have begun the **Barclays Life Skills programme**, a four-session course designed to develop CV writing and interview skills. The first session focused on identifying personal strengths and achievements, encouraging pupils to reflect positively on what they can offer future employers. We are really grateful for this connection with the Barclay's team, and this first session marks another year working in partnership

with them. These sessions have perfectly coincided with work experience launching this half term, with several pupils already securing placements for the week **commencing 6th July 2026**. This is a fantastic start, and we look forward to seeing many more placements confirmed in the coming months and pupil's utilising what they are learning in their Barclay's session to put their best foot forward when applying for the placements.

Something we had loved watching last half term was the support Y10 have for one another, particularly during assemblies. They have also shown "be kind" at Wrenn in the true spirit of Christmas through their enthusiastic engagement in Wrennmas. The initiative encouraged kindness and community, with pupils receiving **red Wrennmas tickets** 🎫 that, when drawn during line-ups, won them a prize and the opportunity to nominate a friend to receive one too. It has been wonderful to see such positivity and generosity across the year group.

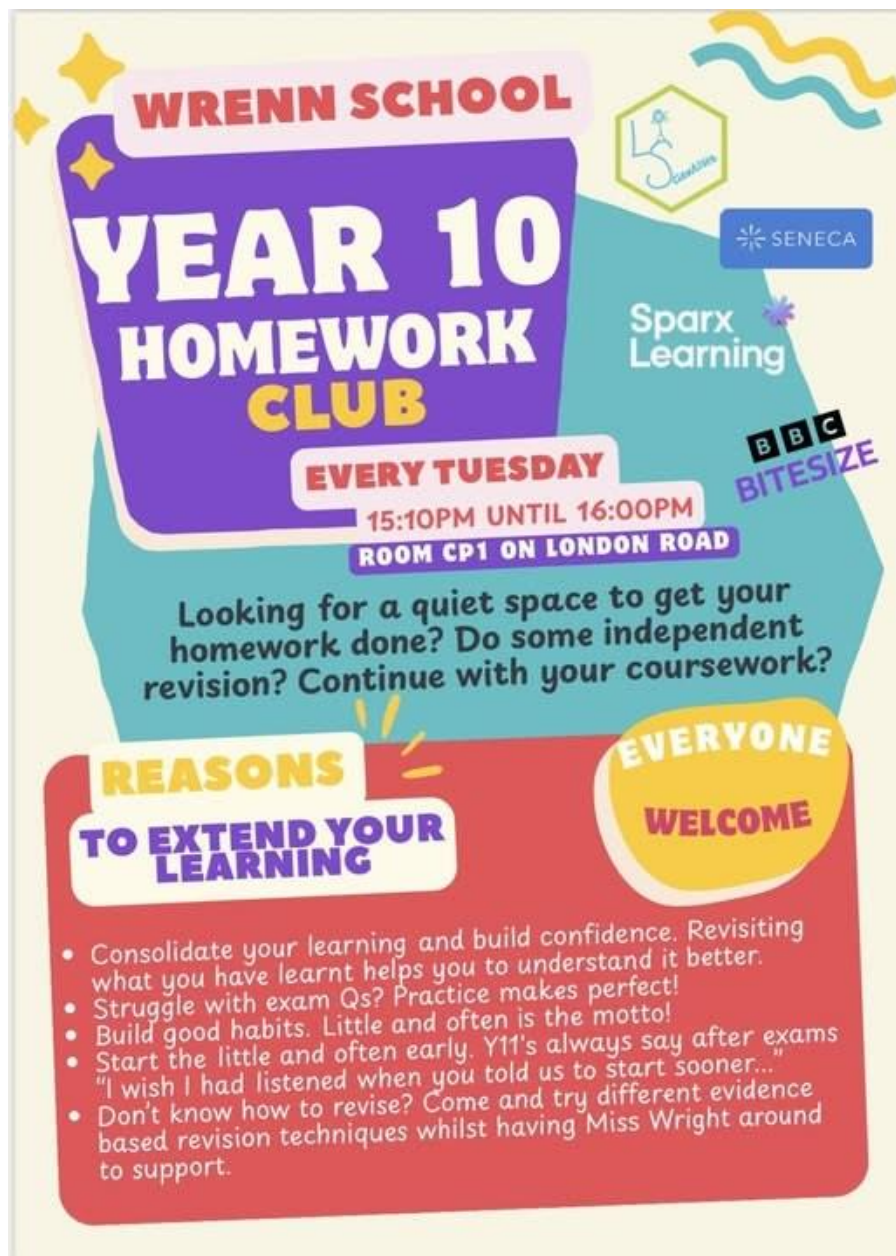
We are incredibly proud of the individual successes achieved last half term. **Samuel W, Marcus B and Sophia D** represented the school in **Cross Country** and have all qualified to represent the district at the **County Championships** in January 2026. **Darcy P** and **Sienna P** independently sourced and completed work experience during the October half term and received phenomenal feedback for both their teamwork and individual skills in the workplace. Year 11

Year 11 had a very busy and productive half term, and I am extremely proud of the maturity and commitment they have shown during this intense time!

The term began with English, Maths and Science assessments, which have provided a clear snapshot of where students are currently performing. Not only this, but experiencing assessments under exam conditions again has been crucial for supporting pupils in learning examination routines and expectations. Once the grades were in, students received their results during a mock results assembly. We discussed the grades but most importantly, pupils were guided to complete a reflection sheet focusing on how effective their revision strategies had been and what they need to do next, or ask for next, in order to improve in their next assessment period. This reflective approach is a vital skill and as I told Y11, reflection means improvement.

Destination assemblies and applications to 6th form took place last half term. Applications for Wrenn Sixth Form are now **closed**, and interviews have already begun. It has been fantastic to see students thinking carefully about their future pathways and engaging positively with these discussions. They are using their mock interview knowledge from last half term and their interviews PSHEE lesson to absolutely smash their sixth form interviews! #proud.

After mocks, we returned to revision as a key focus this term. Students attended revision assemblies where Mrs Patrick (Curriculum Lead for Maths) and Mrs Crawley (Curriculum Lead for English) shared top tips to support effective revision in their subjects #flashcards #showyourworkingsout. In addition, Miss Wright delivered an assembly on the importance of **revision timetables**, demonstrating how to create a realistic and effective timetable that balances revision with hobbies and Period 6 sessions.

In between the academic demands of this term, Year 11 also took part in a mental health workshop, which focused on managing the stress and pressures that naturally come with Year 11 and exam preparation. This was a valuable opportunity for students to reflect on their wellbeing and learn strategies to support themselves during this busy year.

We were also delighted to welcome **Box Clever** back into school, who delivered a live production of **A Christmas Carol** at the end of term. A fantastic performance which is another way of embedding these key texts into our Y11 brains! They returned this week to perform **Macbeth**, which will further support students' learning in English.

As if the last half term hasn't been busy enough, in the last week, all Year 11 students took part in English intervention sessions, focusing on misconceptions and gaps identified from the English assessments earlier this term. These targeted sessions are an important part of ensuring every student continues to make progress. As we move into the new year, there will be more "basics booster" sessions scheduled. This is something we do every year for our Y11 cohorts and proves to be effective in filling those knowledge gaps as we inch closer to exams.

Our *Points Mean Prizes* competition really 'hotted up' before Christmas. A special shout out goes to **Tor, Emmie and Lewis** who achieved the highest Period 6 and LRC attendance last half term - whoop whoop! Well done team! Overall, 139 pupils have attended after-school revision last term – a fantastic effort, but can we push this number closer to 200 this term?

Continuing with **Points Mean Prizes**, we now have 199 pupils who have reached the first prize threshold of 600 points and earned themselves a £10 voucher. As of 16/12/25, the top of the leader board was incredibly close, with **Grace A, William L, Tor W-L and Teofil L** all tied on 840 points each. It is going to be very exciting to see who secures those BIG prizes! We finished the term with a celebration assembly, recognising students nominated by staff for demonstrating a strong Attitude to Learning, showing the Wrenn ethos of working hard, and standing out in lessons or around school. The assembly also included a huge golden

ticket draw as well as another prize draw where x200 £10 vouchers were awarded to students with excellent attendance over the past two weeks using the “**names in a hat**” method.

Well done, Year 11, on a fantastic Autumn term. We hope you got some rest over the break and we now have all subject mocks from the 12th of January. Remember the key to success is sticking to a **revision timetable** and using effective revision strategies when you are revising...

- 45-minute chunks only.
- Do something rather than reviewing something (ie, do an exam question, don't just read).
- Dual coding - pictures and words!
- Try and give examples for everything! (eg, give an example of a quote to show a theme in English).
- Can you make links between topics?

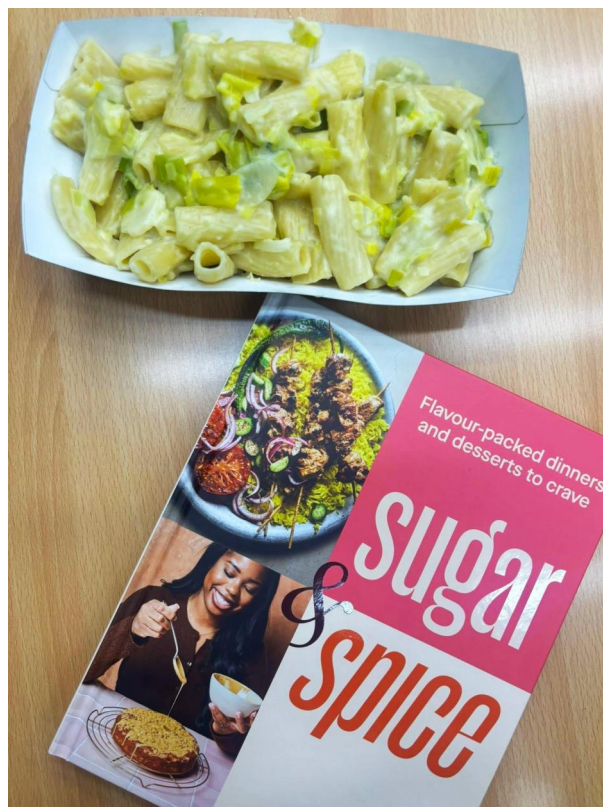

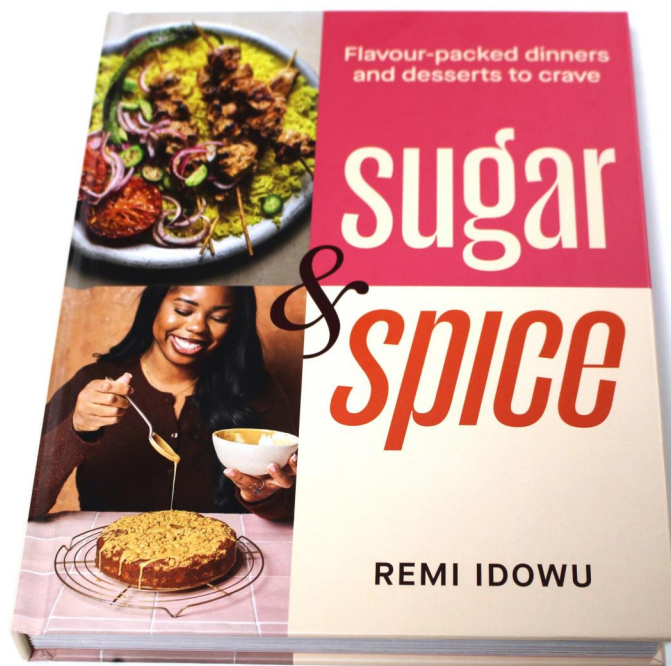

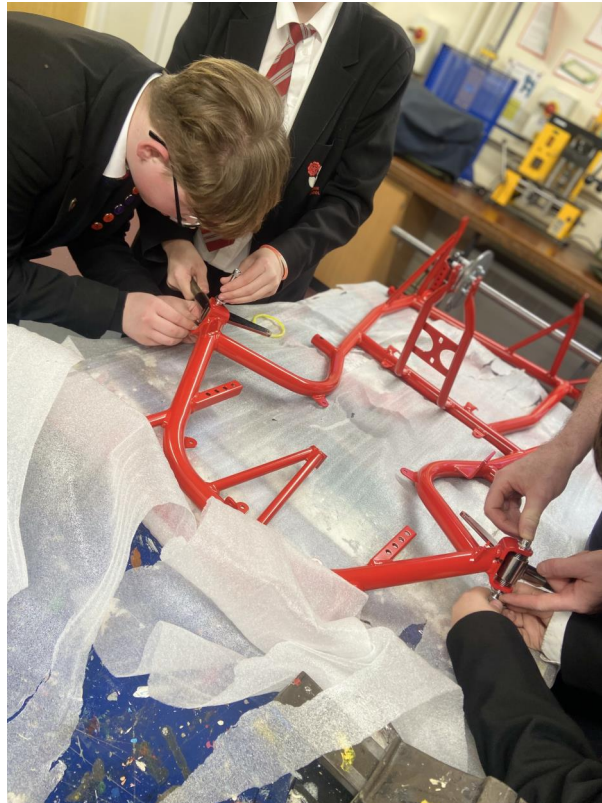
Community Connections Through STEM

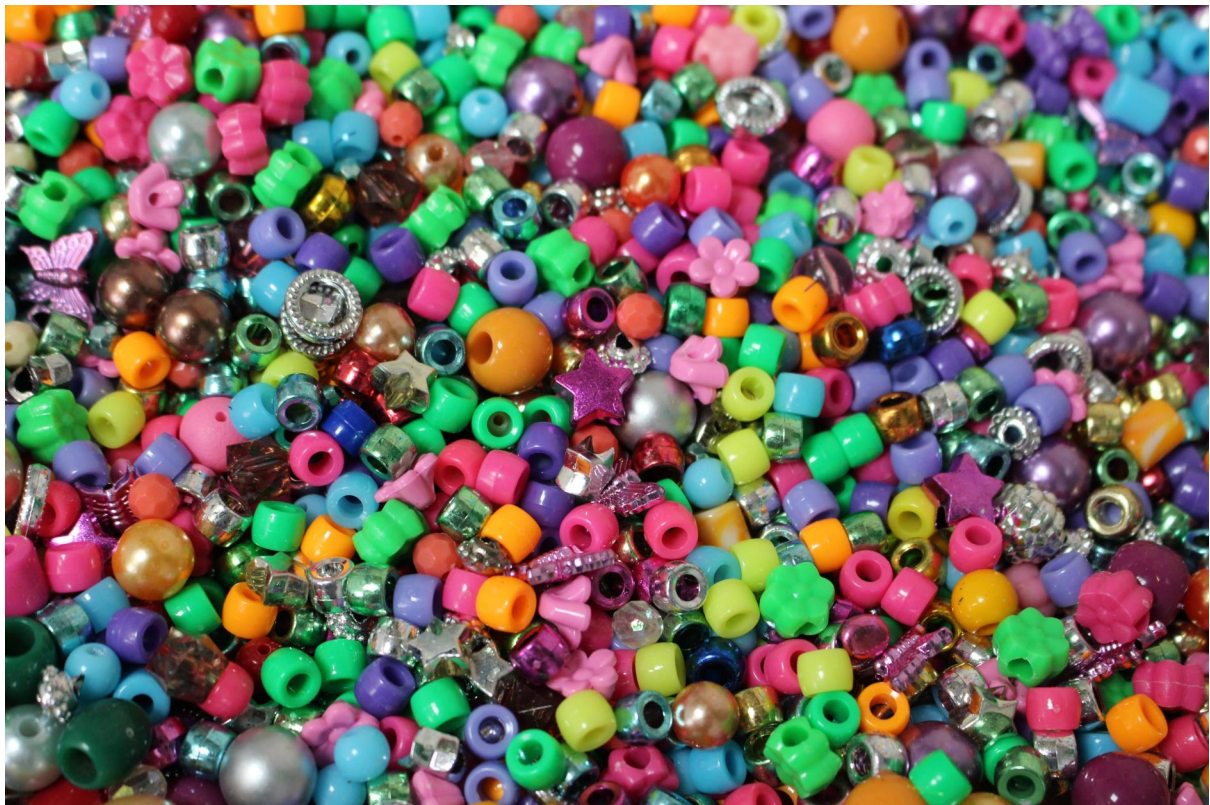

Our First-Ever Year 7 Careers Day: Inspiring Futures from the Start

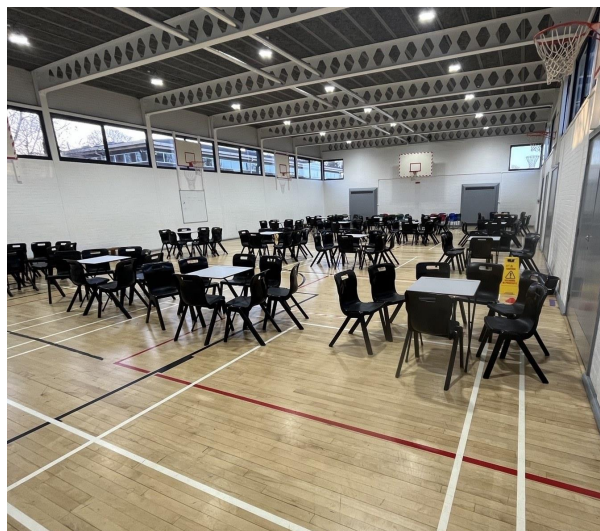
We are thrilled to share the success of our very first **Year 7 Careers Day**.

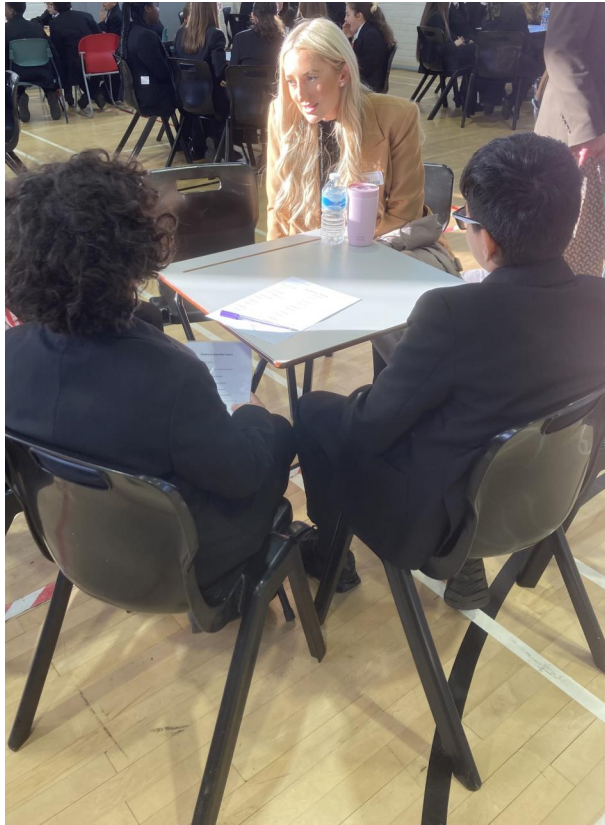

Students rotated through a series of engaging activities designed to inspire and inform:

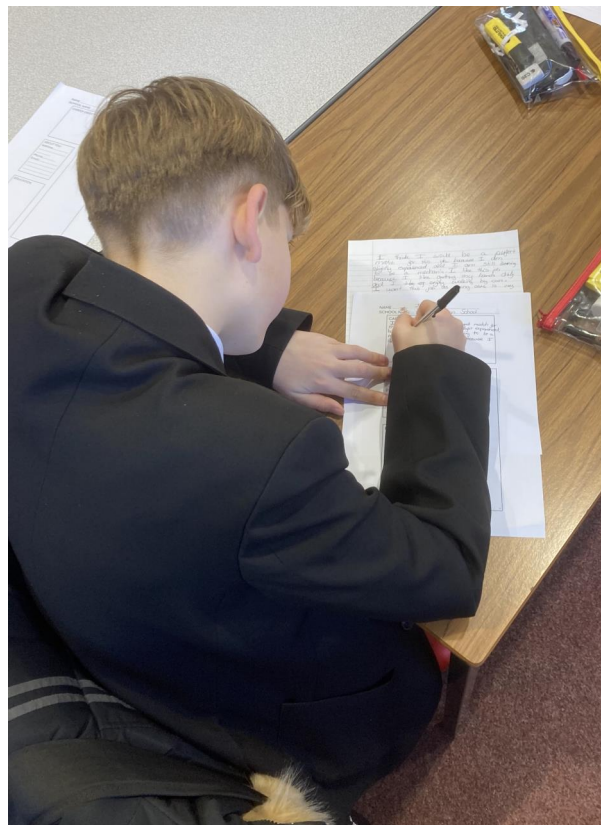
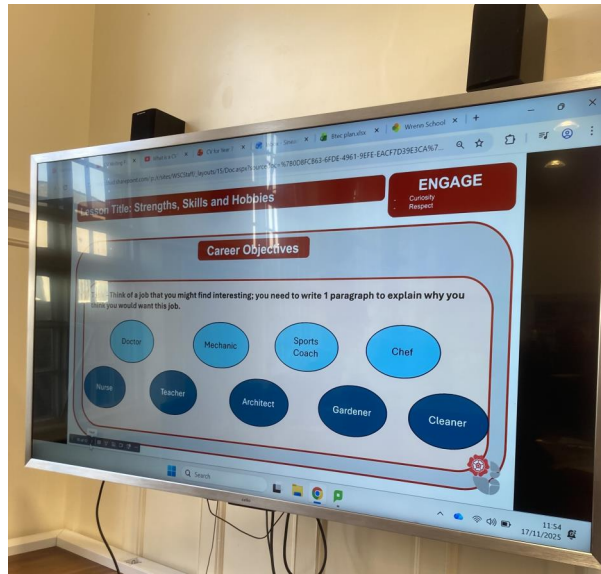
- **Speed Networking** – Students met external volunteers and played a fun game of “Guess the Job Role,” learning about a wide range of professions in the process.

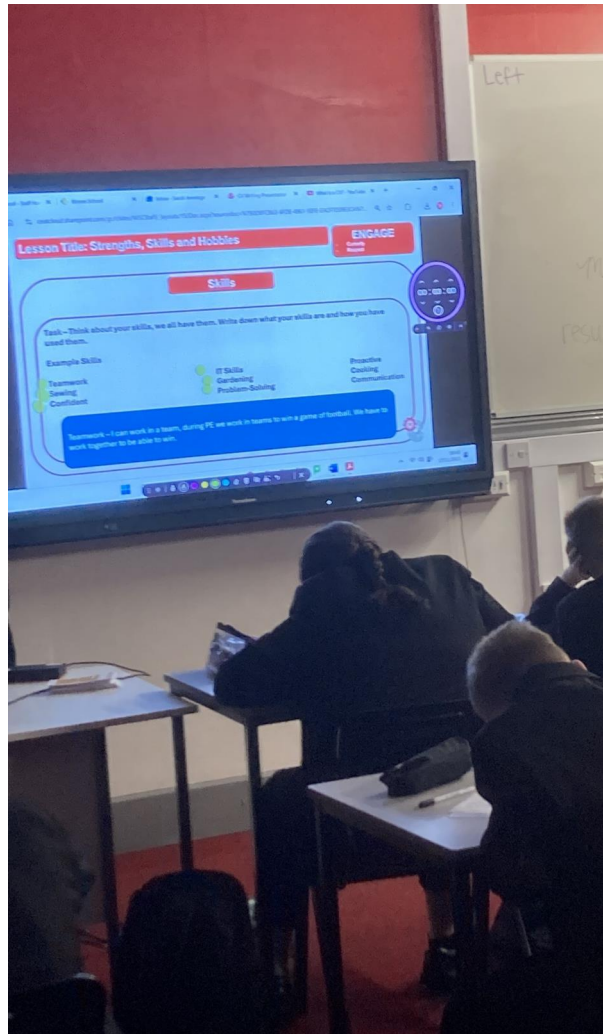

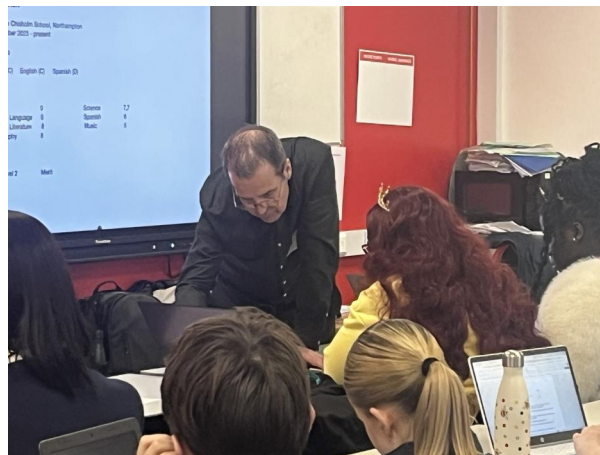

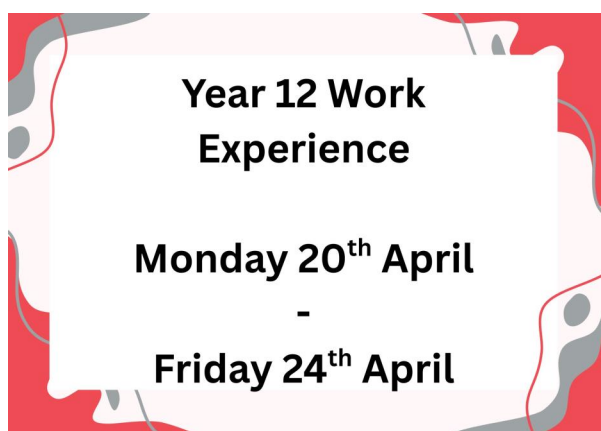
